Council has received a Development Application from Daly International seeking Council's consent to carry out a development near Invergowrie between Mt Mt Mitchell Rd and Marble hill Rd South of Bundarra Rd.

You may inspect the application, including more detailed plans and accompanying documents (excluding internal plans of any residential development), at the Uralla Shire Council office during business hours.

You may also wish to make a submission to Council concerning this proposal. Council is responsible for assessing this application in accordance with the Environmental Planning and Assessment Act. If you make a submission we will carefully consider any comments and the grounds for any objection you may wish to make, and will advise you of our decision. Submissions must be received by Council in writing before close of business on 5 May 2009. I have put up a new 'species' list although it's very old (Sept 1992) I'm sure most of the flora is still standing.

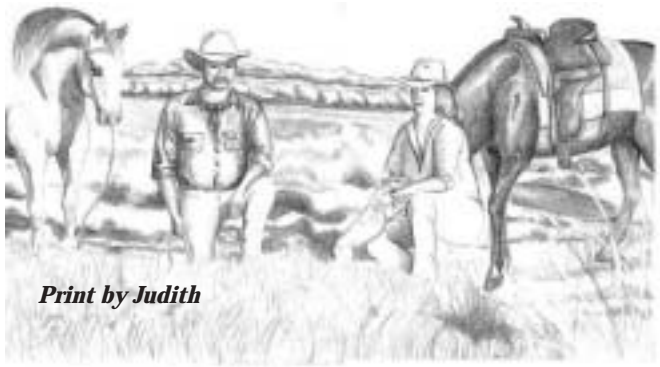

Rabbits

Snakes in your backyard and The Northern Tablelands Wildlife Carers

I urge people to be patient if they have a snake in their backyard. "Monitor it; they're usually just passing through. "Call in the kids and pets, and wait and see," he said. "NTWC is entirely dependent on donations and run by volunteers, and it is difficult for us to answer every call. "Often, by the time we get to a home, the snake is long gone." I tell people to call only if the snake was posing a real threat - had taken up residence in an area where it came into contact with people. And, most of all, he urged people not to reach for the

shovel. "Most snake bites occur when people get close to them to try and kill them. "Snakes are protected native animals and it is an offence to kill one." The best way to avoid snakes in the garden was to remove rubbish piles, wood piles or any other kinds of shelter, and buckets or trays of water, "To eliminate snakes in the house, keep doors shut and any gaps under doors should be blocked - snakes are sneaky and can

get in through those little gaps." The most common snakes appearing in the Armidale area are

red-bellied black snakes and eastern brown snakes. "Always assume that a snake is venomous if you are unsure of the species," . "Snakes will usually avoid humans and head in the other direction unless they are cornered or confronted - snakes are

not aggressive." If the worst happens, a person bitten by a snake must try and remain as calm and still as possible. . Increased activity will make the blood rush faster in your body and therefore spread the venom. Use a pressure/compression

bandage on the bite site, the same pressure you would a sprained ankle. Do not stop circulation. Do not wash the bite area as this will help to determine the type of snake.



Bandage the whole length of the limb when practical, including over clothing where needed. Immobilise the limb, using a splint or bandage, and keep the snake bite victim still.

Get to a hospital as soon as possible. A snake venom detection kit will enable the hospital to detect the type of snake which bit the victim - even if the victim is unsure - and then treat the patient accordingly.
